FEED UPDATE



Canterbury has been very fortunate to have dodged any adverse weather so far this winter (as we write this). Whilst the mild temperatures have meant winter feed crops and dairy pastures have carried on growing, there has been steady demand for silage and straw. With regular phone calls since April, Bruce has been busy procuring lines of silage and straw for our clients.

We have had a fair amount of enquiry from North Island stock feed traders looking for straw to procure. They're mainly wholesalers who "clip the ticket" and buy product as cheaply as possible. Our priority as always, is to continue our ingrained company ethos of building and maintaining sustainable relationships between local Canterbury farmers. Fair deals to both buyer and seller are key, underpinned of course by supply and demand (a true reflection of the current market). We want these relationships to continue, year-in year-out.

Supplement demand will be strong this coming season, and some "thinking outside the square" may be needed beyond a purely grass silage system. At this point, we have both maize silage and cereal silage tonnage available to contract. If you're keen to grow a crop or have a need for supplement this season, please call Bruce Lilley.

CHOPPING NEW JAGUAR/ SHREDLAGE

Due in September 2018 we have a new Claas Jaguar Forage Harvester. This machine has many new features that will improve efficiency and chop quality. Increased sensing ability for foreign objects such as stones will also be very useful.

One feature that will interest those of you who feed maize, is the SHREDLAGE® corn cracker and drum spec we have included. SHREDLAGE® is a method of tearing the material as it goes through the processor. Proven by university studies, independent labs and leading dairies, SHREDLAGE® is a patented conditioning process to produce maize silage. It involves chopping the plant longer than usual (21 to 30 mm), then processing the chopped material with a specially designed SHREDLAGE® processor. The rollers on this patented processor, which have counter-directional helical grooves, chop up the cob fragments completely and crush the kernels to split them thoroughly. In addition, the stalk fragments are also shredded longitudinally into strings and their bark layer is peeled thanks to the special surface of the rollers.

This intensive processing multiplies the surface area of the chopped material many times, resulting in significantly improved bacterial fermentation during ensiling and above all, during digestion in a cow's rumen.

Trials conducted by the University of Wisconsin in 2012 show that SHREDLAGE® drastically increases the physical effectiveness of maize silage in the rumen while also improving the availability of the starch contained in all parts of the plant. As a result, the daily milk yield in the herds studied increased by up to two litres per cow. Furthermore, the rumen-friendly structure of the silage improved herd health.

A higher milk yield and improved livestock health are not the only benefits SHREDLAGE® has to offer dairy producers. As the availability of starch is optimized, it is possible to reduce the quantity of feed concentrate used while obtaining a higher overall milk yield.




HARRY JACKSON
